Star Stitch Skirt

About this Skirt

Making a garment for an adult can seem like a daunting project - most of us are happier with accessories like hats and scarves where the fit seems less critical. However, I'm here to tell you it can be a lot easier than you think. Crocheting a skirt can even be a little more forgiving than making a fabric one.

This simple skirt is made in two identical pieces that are seamed at the sides. The star stitch pattern is easy to work and there is very little counting to do once you've started, so it's a relaxing, rhythmical project. See 'Variations' for ideas on how to make this skirt YOUR OWN.

Materials

The skirt is made with DK (double-knitting, Category 3, light worsted weight) yarn. See 'Yarn Choice' for more information on choosing a suitable yarn. The quantity you need will depend on the size of skirt you are making - see 'Sizing' overleaf.

You will also need some 20mm/% inch wide elastic. Choose a tone to match your yarn, so white for light colours or brown/black for dark colours. The quantity you need will depend on the size of skirt you are making - see 'Sizing' overleaf.

You will need a little sewing thread, ideally in a colour to match your elastic.

Equipment

You need a 3.5mm crochet hook or the size you need to obtain the correct tension with your chosen yarn.

You will need a blunt-tipped yarn or tapestry needle. You will also need a sharp sewing needle.

You will need a tape measure or ruler and some sharp scissors.

This pattern uses British crochet conventions and vocabulary and prints on A4 paper: a version with US crochet conventions and vocabulary, which prints on US Letter paper is also available.
