GEORGIE PATTERN DESCRIPTION

Georgie is a fitted cropped blouse. The center front features a cutout finished with drawstring casings and gathered with ties. The front hem has an elastic casing. The blouse has a split back. The two back parts are joined with long ties forming a bow. The blouse has a deep V-neckline on the front and back. The short set-in puffed sleeves are above elbow-length. The sleeves are gathered at the cap and have an elastic casing at the hem.

SUGGESTED FABRIC

To sew this blouse, choose woven fabrics with the following properties:

- light to medium weight, low drape, non-stretch
- the fiber content can include natural fibers (silk, cotton, linen), artificial (acetate, viscose), blends (cotton + viscose, etc) and synthetics (polyester)
- the following fabrics are recommended: sateen, poplin, linen, broderie, opaque cotton shirting, viscose, batiste.

For the lining, the following fabrics are recommended: cotton shirting, poplin, batiste.

The blouse in the photos is made from 100% linen. The fabric is medium-weight, without stretch. The lining is made from 100% cotton batiste.

TOOLS AND EQUIPMENT

- sewing machine for construction
- overlocker for finishing raw edges. This may be replaced with a stretch overlock stitch or a zigzag stitch on the sewing machine (overlock or zigzag stitch width 2-3mm, stitch length 2.5mm)
- edgestitch foot for the sewing machine (optional)
- loop turner
- · bodkin / elastic threader
- · buttonhole foot for the sewing machine

PATTERN PIECES LIST

- 1. From main fabric:
- front cut 2
- back cut 2
- sleeve cut 2
- front tie cut 2
- · back tie cut 2

- 2. From lining:
- front cut 2
- · back cut 2

Also from the lining fabric, cut bias binding to finish armscye seams (optional).

IMPORTANT! Don't forget to transfer all the notches from the pattern to your fabric.

SEAM ALLOWANCES

Pattern pieces include the following seam allowances:

· all edges - 1cm

Take this into account when laying out pattern pieces on the fabric.

There are two ways to prepare a garment for a fitting:

- use a long machine stitch (4-5mm stitch length)
- baste by hand (approximately 1cm stitch length). Make sure to baste on a flat surface, like a table, don't leave the fabric unsupported.

Important! If the needle leaves visible holes in the fabric (leather, suede, rainwear fabric, silk, etc.), we recommend making a MUSLIN to check for fitting issues. In this case, there is no need for a baste fitting, except to check the length. We recommend testing your material before you start sewing.

If after basting one of the pieces ends up longer than the other, don't rush to trim the longer piece or stretch the shorter one. First make sure that the notches match, lay out the pieces on a flat surface and try basting again. If the pieces still don't match because they've stretched or there has been a cutting mistake, you can always trim the pieces after the fitting during the construction of the garment.

After basting the garment, press it lightly and press the seams to one side.

What to look for during fitting?

Check the garment balance: side seams should be aligned vertically.

Evaluate the fit of the front and back while looking at the person from the side. Front and back should not be riding up or sagging.

Check the side seams from the front and back. There should be no pulling or sagging at the sides.

Check the length of the garment.

Check for issues caused by unique features of the person's body (for example if the figure is asymmetrical, with one shoulder higher than the other, etc.)

Make sure there is enough ease for a comfortable fit.

After the first fitting, make adjustments and then do another baste fitting if necessary.



Mark the placement of the buttonholes on the right side of the front piece and stitch the buttonholes on the sewing machine.

Carefully cut the buttonholes open.
