MICHAELA PATTERN DESCRIPTION

Michaela is a lined dress with a close-fitting bodice and a flared skirt. It features a waist seam and a low square neckline. The front bodice is fitted with bust and waist darts transferred to the princess seams. The back bodice is fitted with shoulder darts transferred to the neckline, as well as with waist darts. The dress features a faux closure with buttons and rouleau loops at the front and fastens with an invisible zipper in the center back seam. The lining features a hem flounce peeking out from underneath the outer skirt. The long, set-in sleeves consist of two pieces. The top puff piece is gathered at the cap and bottom while the close-fitting bottom piece is straight. Michaela is above-knee length.

SUGGESTED FABRIC

To sew this dress, choose dress-weight and suiting fabrics with the following properties:

- · medium weight, structured, breathable, with good drape, non-stretch or with very little stretch
- the fiber content can include natural fibers (cotton, linen), blends (cotton + viscose, etc.), and synthetics (polyester, polyester + elastane)
- the following fabrics are recommended: dress-weight denim, cotton, linen, dress-weight and suiting fabrics

Attention! We do not recommend stretchy knit fabrics and lightweight sheer fabrics (chiffon, organza, stretch lace).

For the lining, we recommend natural fibers or blends (viscose + elastane, viscose + polyester).

The dress in the photo is made of cotton. The fabric is medium weight, with good drape and very little stretch. The fiber content is 100% cotton.

The lining is 100% cotton.

TOOLS AND EQUIPMENT

- sewing machine for construction
- overlocker for finishing raw edges. This may be replaced with a stretch overlock stitch or a zigzag stitch on the sewing machine (overlock or zigzag stitch width 2–3 mm, stitch length 2.5 mm)
- stitch-in-the-ditch foot for the sewing machine (optional)
- invisible zipper foot for the sewing machine
- · one-sided foot for the sewing machine

PATTERN PIECES LIST

1. From main fabric:

- front bodice cut 2
- · side front bodice cut 2
- front skirt cut 1 on fold
- back bodice cut 2
- back skirt cut 2
- · top sleeve cut 2
- bottom sleeve cut 2
- front neck facing cut 1 on fold
- back neck facing cut 2
- rouleau strap for button loops cut 1

2. From lining fabric:

- front bodice lining cut 1 on fold
- side front bodice lining cut 2
- front skirt lining cut 1 on fold
- back bodice lining cut 2
- back skirt lining cut 2
- front lining hem flounce cut 1 on fold
- · back lining hem flounce cut 1 on fold

3. From interfacing:

- front neck facing cut 1 on fold
- back neck facing cut 2

IMPORTANT! Don't forget to transfer all pattern markings and notches onto the fabric.

Additionally, cut two interfacing strips that are 2 cm (3/4") wide and as long as the interfaced area, to reinforce the zipper seam allowances. Cut two interfacing strips that are 1 cm (3/8") wide and as long as the interfaced area, to reinforce the bottom edge of the bottom sleeve. The interfacing strips should be cut on the straight grain (parallel to the selvedge).

SEAM ALLOWANCES

All pattern pieces include seam allowances as follows:

- garment and sleeve hem allowances 2 cm (3/4")
- zipper seam allowances 1.5 cm (5/8")
- all other edges 1 cm (3/8")

Take this into account when laying out pattern pieces on the fabric.

If one of the pieces ends up longer than the other after basting, do not rush to true them by cutting off the excess. First make sure that the notches are properly matched, lay the pieces on a flat surface and try to re-baste them together. If the pieces still don't match in length because they have stretched or there has been a cutting mistake, you can always true the pieces after the fitting, during the construction of the garment.

After assembling the garment, press it lightly and press the seam allowances either to one side or open.

What to look for during fitting?

The left and right sides of the bodice should look the same.

Verify the garment balance: the side seams and the center back line should be vertical, the shoulder seams should lie on the natural shoulder line.

The garment hem should be parallel to the floor.

Evaluate the fit of the front and back while looking at the person from the side. The front and back should not sag or ride up. There should be no horizontal folds at the back, no pulling at the shoulder blade area and shoulders.

Verify the garment length.

Check the fit of the sleeve. The sleeve should lie smoothly, without folds or wrinkles.

Check for fit issues associated with individual features of the body.

Verify the garment volume, there should be enough ease for a comfortable fit.

After the fitting, make changes symmetrically to both sides of the garment; if needed, baste once more for another fitting.



Pin and baste the shoulder and waist darts on the wrong side of the back bodice pieces. Machine-stitch the darts, backstitching at the raw edge.

Important! Use light-colored thread in order to avoid marking the fabric during pressing and steaming.

Leave long thread tails at the dart point, tie them into a knot and hide them inside the dart bulk using a large-eye needle.
